- Toledo: The Toledo area, including Northwest Ohio and Southeast Michigan, offers the amenities of larger cities without sacrificing the advantages of a small-town atmosphere. Located on the banks of the Maumee River at the western end of Lake Erie, Toledo is the crossroads of the nation. Two of the nation's largest highways meet in northwestern Ohio (I-75 and I-80/90) and Toledo is also one of the busiest ports on the Great Lakes. In addition, Toledo has its own Toledo Express Airport and is located less than 1.5 hours from Detroit Airport, making it an excellent place to call home base for those that like to travel. Best of all, the Toledo area is a great place to raise a family! The real estate market is very affordable relative to other metro areas, yet the area boasts excellent school systems, health care, entertainment, recreation, and cultural diversity. In addition, there is plenty to do here, no matter what your interests or hobbies.



PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION & DRIVING

Driving: Bowling Green Ohio is conveniently located within reasonable driving distance of several major cities in the region. Toledo Ohio is the closest major city, typically a 25–30-minute drive. Detroit Michigan is a major metropolitan area, and the drive usually takes around 1 hour and 30 minutes to 2 hours depending on the traffic and the route taken. Other major cities include Fort Wayne Indiana (2 hours) and Indianapolis Indiana (3 hours). Most of Bowling Green's attractions are accessible by car.



Public Transit: The primary mode of public transportation within the city is provided by Bowling Green Transit (BGT), a local fixed-route bus service operated by the city. BGT operates several fixed routes that connect key locations within the city, including Bowling Green State University (BGSU), the downtown area, shopping centers, and residential neighborhoods. BGT's service is primarily designed to serve the local community, including students, residents, and visitors.

Bicycle: Several different biking paths, trails, and roads in Bowling Green to explore.

Air: Two airports near Bowling Green, the closest being Toledo Express Airport (TOL): Located approximately 20 miles north of Bowling Green, Toledo Express Airport is the closest commercial airport to Bowling Green. It offers flights to various domestic destinations, making it a convenient option for travelers in the area. A bit further from Bowling Green is Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport (DTW): Situated about 70 miles northeast of Bowling Green, a major international airport serving the Detroit, Michigan, metropolitan area. DTW offers a wide range of domestic and international flights and is a common choice for travelers looking for more flight options and connections.

Train: The closest Amtrak station to Bowling Green is in Toledo, Ohio. Travelers can take a bus or drive to the Toledo Amtrak station from Bowling Green, which is approximately 20 miles away. The Toledo Amtrak station is part of the Capitol Limited and Lake Shore Limited routes, providing connections to cities such as Chicago, Cleveland, and Washington, D.C.



DRIVER'S LICENSE or STATE ID CARD

If you are a visitor in Ohio over 18 and have a valid driver license from your home state or country, you may drive in this state without getting a driver license as long as your home state license remains valid. If you become a resident, you must get an Ohio driver license within 30 days.
